THE SUBDIVISION.**

Each section is subdivided into 128 five-acre tracts, numbered consecutively, according to the plan adopted by the United States General Land Office, from the northeast corner. On each of the four sides of a section is a 25-foot road, and running north and thru the section are three other wide roads. Besides these one wide road runs thru the center of the section east and west. Thus every tract faces on one wide road. The diagram below shows the scheme of subdivision:
